Opportunity Knocks

This summer we laid the groundwork for a promotional program for the Opportunity Page. Our first test ads on Facebook and Google garnered almost 300 click-throughs to the Opportunity Page - which tells us that we can do very effective outreach this way.

These platforms enable us to deliver individualized messages about the opportunities in the Ti Area. Our fall campaign will target various demographic groups including people with ties to the Adirondacks exploring life changes, would-be entrepreneurs, and retiring baby boomers.

We received a non-profit grant from Google that provides \$10,000 of free Google advertising each month. That's a LOT of advertising power that we can make available to our community. - the national Rural Workforce Innovation Network workgroup on rural workforce development,

These peer-to-peer forums are a treasure trove of information and an inspiration to us every day. The more information we have, the more effective we can be. And participation gives us a voice.
